Instructions

Ask the pupils to search in the classroom, or outside for anything of a particular colour. Ask them to write it down or remember it.

Health & Safety

- Ensure floors are clear of trip hazards before taking part in any activity
- Ensure pupils leave stationary on the table
- Remind pupils of their own spatial awareness
- Give clear instructions.

Teacher Tips

Foundation: Ask pupils to find any object of that particular colour

Key Stage 1: Increase the Challenge e.g. only things you'd find in your school bag

Key Stage 2: Make it into a competition of who can find the most objects, also can make it more challenging by the objects must begin with a vowel

Colour Search

Foundation Example:

For example, if the pupils were asked to look for the colour blue, these are some examples of what they could come up with:

- Colouring pencils
- The sky
- School bag
- Notice board or display in the classroom
- Running trainers
- Glasses
- Water bottles

Key Stage 1 Example:

For example, if the pupils were asked to look for the colour red, and the teacher wanted to increase the challenge by saying the items can only be things you'd find in your school bag, these are some examples of what they could come up with:

- Pencil case
- Notebook
- Colouring pencils or markers
- Rubber or sharpener
- Water bottle
- Coat
- Gloves

Key Stage 2 Example:
